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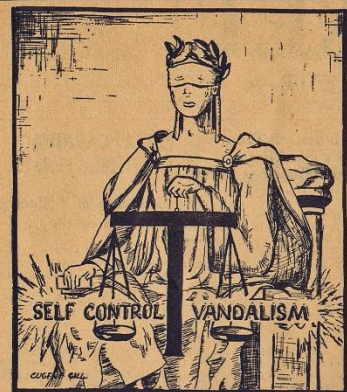

Those who pass the examination will be eligible for a four-year scholarship to any college or university offering an N.R.O.T.C. course.

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
