Science Club Observes

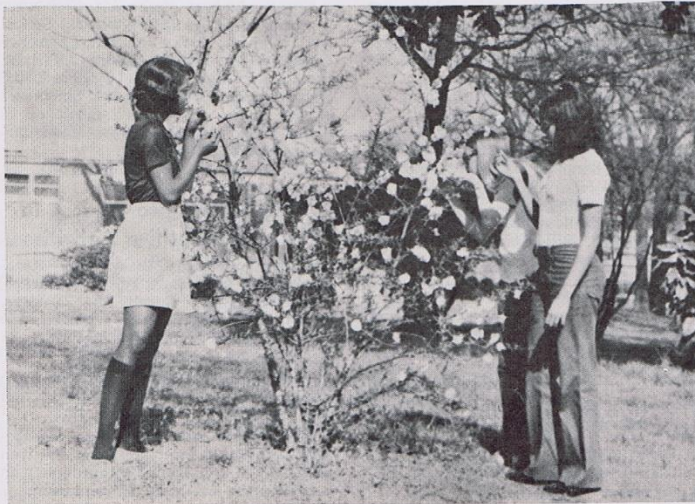
Earth Day
