## History And Traditions Of Tech Revealed

Memphis Technical High School is one of the oldest schools in the city. Many older people can remember when Tech High was located at 317 Poplar, but the history of the school goes back even further.

New students are always curious about the history of their school. How old is it? What are some of its traditions? Many students from last year may not know the answers to these questions.

There are four periods in the past for Tech. The first covers the years 1878 to 1892; the second from 1892 to 1917; the third from 1917 to 1928; and the fourth from 1928 to the present.

Tech began in 1878 as Hope Night School, founded as a private school by Mr. J. C. Johnson, who saw the need for occupational training for boys who had been orphaned by the War between the states, and the yellow fever epidemic. The school was operated in a building on Main Street owned by Mr. Johnson, who also financed the operation of the school. After Mr. Johnson left Memphis, his daughter, Miss Lillian Wyckoff Johnson continued the operation until it be-

## Graduation Climaxes Twelve Year Effort Tech Passes Evaluation

A year of preparation and study by the faculty and students of Tech was climaxed with a favorable report on the school to the Southern Association of High Schools and Colleges. The head of the Evaluation Committee, Dr. Elzie Danley of Memphis State, brought in a team of teachers and education specialists to study the overall performance of Tech High. Each faculty member was interviewed and observed by the visiting committee. All aspects of the administration, curriculum, and facilities were investigated, by the team of twenty men and women, all from outside the city schools.

"The friendly, relaxed atmosphere and the obvious rapport among the students and faculty," were Dr. Danley's words to describe the feelings at Tech. Many commendations of various departments were made and a number of recommendations for future improvement were offered. Tech will profit from this visit. This type of evaluation is made each ten years in order for the school to keep its accreditation in the Southern Association.

Graduation is upon us at last! On Tuesday, May 21, Tech Seniors will culminate twelve years of effort in ceremonies at 8:00 p.m. in the Auditorium Music Hall. Over 240 Seniors and graduating juniors will walk across the stage to receive diplomas or certificates.

Seniors were issued their caps and gowns on Friday, May 17, after practicing in the auditorium at Tech. Their first chance to wear them came on Sunday, May 19, at the baccalaureat service, held at Speedway Baptist Church, 601 North Bellevue, at 3:00 p.m.

The second and final wearing of caps and gowns will be Tuesday night when they say goodbye to Tech and hello to the world of college, work, marriage, and responsibility.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 came part of the public schools in 1892.

Tech had many locations during the years following 1892, but came more permanently located at 317 Poplar in 1917. Mr. J. L. Highsaw became principal of the school, then called Crockett Technical in 1917. Mr. Highsaw, a native of Texas and a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, had been a classroom teacher prior to his appointment as principal of Crockett Tech.

Mr. Highsaw served as principal from 1917 until the new building was completed in 1928 when he and his faculty moved to the new Tech at 1266 Poplar. Mr. Highsaw remained at Memphis Tech until the spring of 1957 when he retired. Many leaders throughout the nation are among the thousands who graduated from Tech High.

Mr. W. A. Bourne became principal in 1957. Under his leadership Tech has continued to serve the entire City of Memphis in the established tradition. One of Mr. Bourne's proudest accomplishments was having a new gymnasium constructed in 1964. Many new courses have been added to the curriculum under Mr. Bourne's guidance.

Loyalty and friendliness are two traditions at Tech. Many former students support the school in many ways and keep in touch with Mr. Bourne. Tech students are also proud of the beauty of the well-established trees and shrubs which make the campus one of the loveliest in the area.

The school colors are blue and gold. The motto is "Ad Astra per Aspera", which is Latin for "to the stars through striving." The mascot is the yellowjacket, the athletic symbol which is also featured on the class rings.

Truly students at Memphis Technical High School have much to be proud of in the history and traditions of their school.

## Tips on job hunting

Here are a few tips on getting a job after graduation. Upon leaving school, be sure to seek an employer who can meet the following conditions:

You should receive at least \$326 per month spending money after regular monthly expenses and deductions have been paid. Request regular promotions with increases in pay for promotions and for length of employment. And, you should receive your first promotion, and pay raise to \$363 after four months.

Request 30 days paid vacation per year starting with your first year. You should also have low rate or free world travel privileges any time you are on vacation.

You should be able to continue your education with the company paying 75 per cent of the cost. If you are selected for college, your tuition should be paid and your normal salary continued.

Ask your prospective employer for a clothing allowance of some \$300 for initial outfitting for your job and at least \$4.50 per month to maintain or replace worn-out clothing. At the same time, request a cost of living allowance and quarters allowance for your wife and family. This should be in the form of \$105 to \$200 per month added to your regular salary.

Your new employer should provide swimming pools, tennis courts, bowling alleys, boats, fishing gear, golf courses, movie theaters, libraries and craft or hobby shops including photo labs. All this for your leisure use.

The employer should also provide unlimited sick leave with full pay for the entire sick period. Any medical or dental care for yourself should be free with additional free medical care for your entire family.

The prospective company you wish to work for should provide you with a grocery, department and variety store plus laundries, service stations, auto repair and restaurants which reduce your cost of purchase or expense up to 40 per cent.

Make sure the company's retirement clause states you may retire after 20 years with them at 50 per cent pay and 75 per cent at 30 years, plus continued free medical care for yourself and dependents.

After all this, inform your prospective employer that you want a bonus of up to \$10,000 in cash after four years with him to stay another six years.

And then don't forget to let this employer know that you are not experienced in the work but would like to be sent to school at full pay and receive all the company benefits right from the start and through school.
